Walking With Our Neighbors

At our most recent congregational financial meeting, we passed an exciting motion to partner with our friends at First Presbyterian Church in seeking to create a permanent warming shelter for Manitowoc. During 2025, First Lutheran will be giving \$10,000 to support this effort while also hoping to match another \$10,000 raised from the congregation with another \$10,000. So our total goal is \$30,000, at least!

If you would like to support this effort, please know you can give to the church for the "Walking With Our Neighbors Fund" or wait for further information as the planning for this fund-raising gains more steam.

As you may know, it was once hoped that the McKinley Building would be able to house a warming shelter for our area but that project needed to be narrowed in its focus so as to be able to empower Hope House and The Haven in their needs for our community. This left the Manitowoc Warming Shelter with a need to find a new permanent home for their important work and the funds we raise will support those efforts.

First is joining other faith communities in our area at supporting these efforts and we look forward to joyously working to embrace those who are in need in this way. Thank you, Members and Friends, for your courageous faithfulness!

COORDINATORS: * Personal Care Kits— basics including towels, soap, comb, nail clipper, toothbrush * School Kits— School bags, to include notebooks, pens, pencils, rulers, scissors, etc.

*OVERALL: Mission Coordinators call for October transportation of kits, schedule times to assemble kits, gather boxes for

completed kits, contact four area churches who may want to share transportation.

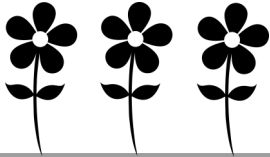

VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT

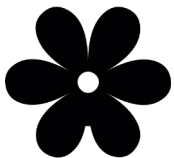

A FIRST ATTEMPT AT ESTABLISHING A LUTHERAN CHURCH—THE UNTOLD STORY

Norwegians began coming to Manitowoc County in the late 1840s, encouraged by Stephan Olson Helle, who had previously visited here. Some settled on the north side of the city, others in various enclaves out in the forested rural woodlands. Early immigrants, of any nationality, usually gathered around their own kind. This was important for purposes of communication certainly, but it also functioned as a support system in a very strange and new place. This is no different today with new immigrants.

We do not know specifically what induced these particular Norwegians to leave their homeland, but the situation in Norway was certainly difficult in the mid 1800s, prompted by overpopulation, a dearth of food stuffs, and the industrial revolution, which was endangering the working lives of the small cottagers, who possessed special skills such as woodworking, weaving, and pottery making.

Once settled, it was not uncommon for an immigrant group like the Norwegians to gather in each others' homes and discuss calling a pastor. They felt a deep need for a clergyman to baptize their children, bury their dead, and administer Holy Communion. Sermons could be read from books available to both pastors and lay persons.

The first protestant church established in Manitowoc was the Anglican St. James Episcopal Church. This is not surprising, since a large share of the area population in the late 1840s were easterners who had migrated west from the New England states to work in the lumbering industry. Their religious backgrounds were in the Episcopalian or Congregational churches. Rather ironically, however, the first pastor of the St. James parish was a Swedish immigrant named Gustavus Unonius.

Unonius had come to America in 1841 and settled in southeastern Wisconsin near Pine Lake in Waukesha County. When he decided to leave farming and enter the ministry, the only available seminary was the newly-opened Episcopalian Nashotah Seminary near where he lived.

Given the similarity between the Norwegian and Swedish languages, the local Norwegians approached Unonius about ministering to them as well. In what has to be a reference to these Norwegians, Gustavus Unonius writes in the second volume of his book *A Pioneer in Northwest America* (p. 153):

"The next day the few church members living in the town met, along with a few others who felt they ought to cooperate in securing a minister for their town. The latter group would have preferred that he be selected from the church they had formerly belonged to, or to which they thought they still belonged, or from some other denomination with which they felt more closely related than to the Episcopal Church; but since that could not be done and since regular services, of whatever kind, were admittedly better than no services at all, they agreed, at least for the time being, to make common cause with the members of the Episcopal Church." Nine of the twenty-two charter members listed in the records of St. James congregation are Norwegians, and Unonius, in a report to the larger church, states that he holds services in Norwegian for "a few" of his members. Sadly, Gustavus Unonius remained in Manitowoc only one year. He had been a well-liked and highly respected pastor and citizen, and his departure had to be especially difficult for the Norwegians. With little prospect of another Anglican - Scandinavian pastor, the St. James record book notes a transfer for each Norwegian, when it states next to their name, "Removed to Norwegian settlement." Now a more serious effort would have to be made to establish a Lutheran church in Manitowoc.

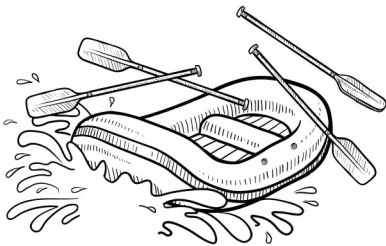

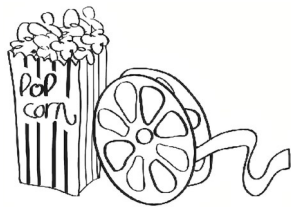


